FIREFIGHTER EMPLOYMENT INFORMATION – East Bay Parks Regional Park District:

One of our former students, Rob Willson, who now works for the [East Bay Parks Regional Fire District](#), asked me to pass along the following information regarding their current firefighter recruitment. Thanks Rob!

Please forward the following information regarding an open application period for the position of **Firefighter II** with the East Bay Regional Park District.

The minimum requirements are:

- High school diploma or equivalent
- California State Fire Marshal Firefighter I Certificate (not academy completion)

-Valid Title 22 EMT Certificate

-2 years of firefighting experience (up to one year can be substituted with education credit), wildland experience preferred

-Valid Commercial Class B (not Firefighter Class B) with no restrictions at time of appointment

Just a quick overview of the department:

-EBRPD protects close to 100,000 acres of parkland throughout Alameda and Contra Costa Counties

-Our personnel consists of a Chief, Assistant Chief, three Captains, seven Firefighter IIs, three Firefighter Is, an administrative assistant and an auxiliary fire staff of 48.

-Though we currently have no open positions, we expect to have FFII vacancies during the life of this hiring pool.

-We work a 40-hour week usually consisting of four consecutive 10-hour days. We staff overnight during Red Flag and other appropriate weather events.

-Our fleet consists of four Type III engines, ten Type IV engines, one Type II OES engine, one Water Tender, two helicopters and a Zodiac.

-We are active members in the Mutual Aid system and are available for Out of County assignments through Alameda County, Contra Costa County, OES and CAL FIRE.

-We have good working relationships with all municipal agencies that border our parkland and have a contract with CAL FIRE SCU for auto aid for all SRA fires north of 580 and west of 680.

-At times we have been called to staff SCU stations 14 and 16 when CAL FIRE resources have been drawn down due to large local or out of county response.

-We have an active fuels management program that includes use of CAL FIRE crews, pile burning and prescribed fire.

-FFII wage starts at \$4520.00 per month and overtime tends to be readily available throughout the fire season.

-Benefits include (but not limited to) full medical, dental, deferred comp and PERS 3% at 50.

-This is a great place to rub elbows with other bay area municipal Fire Departments.

-Applications are due no later than 5:00 pm on October 24, 2007.

FIREFIGHTER EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES:

If you want to become a firefighter, have you started taking fire department examinations yet? If not, what are you waiting for? If you say you're not ready, you'll probably never be ready. If you want to wait until you finish your degree, then you're going to have wasted about two (or more) valuable years that could have been spent learning how to master the fire service testing process. You should be taking every fire service exam you qualify for – what's the worst that can happen if you take a test? If nothing else, you will hopefully start to learn your strengths and weaknesses and what it takes to become a firefighter.

Don't rely on us to provide you with every fire department that is accepting applications. We only send out a small fraction of the current open firefighter positions across the United States. If you truly want to become a firefighter, put your money where your mouth is and subscribe to a fire testing service that will notify you when fire departments across the United States are accepting applications.

For less than \$100.00 per year (each), those companies (run by firefighters) will provide you with valuable testing information to help save you time and effort. Becoming a firefighter is not an easy task, and the badge will not drop from the sky into your lap. Don't wait for your friends to tell you about testing opportunities or expect to hear about them from us. That is not our job, to replace such companies.

FIREFIGHTER SAFETY INFORMATION:

RESCUE

ARE YOU IN OR OUT?

It's 2 A.M. and your 3 person engine company arrives at scene of a two story, wood frame, single family dwelling. There is fire showing from the first floor of the Alpha/Delta corner, and your next due engine is two minutes out. The question for you is, *do you go in or stay out?*

Since 1952 when Lloyd Layman outlined the basic divisions of fire tactics through RECEO, the fire service has placed Rescue as the top priority when conducting fire operations. However, for many departments that all changed in 1998, when Federal OSHA modified the Respiratory Protection Standard (29 CFR, 1910.134) to include structural firefighting. The Respiratory Standard is commonly known as the Two-in/Two-out Standard. This Standard together with an interpretation of the standard produced jointly by the IAFC/IAFF changed firefighting operations across the country.

So, did the new Respiratory Standard have an affect on the way your fire department establishes tactical priorities? If so, you're not alone. Many departments have taken the "R" out of RECEO, by developing policies based on inaccurate information. It's time we revisit the Respiratory Standard and see what it really says about two in/two out so we can put the "R" back in RECEO.

First, we need to establish who is required to have a two in/two out policy. If you're a municipal firefighter, the federal Standard may not apply to you unless you work in an OSHA state. The OSHA States that have a two in/two out provision include.

In addition, Florida, Illinois and Oklahoma have adopted State Law that references the Federal OSHA regulations. The federal OSHA Standard applies to all private sector firefighters, industrial fire brigades, and federal firefighters. Check with your own state as many have adopted similar two in/two out regulations.

Once a federal standard is adopted, OSHA state agencies have 6 months to adopt a plan that is as effective as the federal standard. Therefore, most state plans should be similar to the federal standard.

Since states are allowed to make their standard more but not less restrictive, it is important that you review your specific plan.

In 1998 OSHA added the following section, (g)(4), regarding Structural Firefighting in 29 CFR 1910.134.

Excerpt from Standard-

Procedures for interior structural firefighting. In addition to the requirements set forth under paragraph (g)(3), in interior structural fires, the employer shall ensure that:

1910.134(g)(4)(i)

At least two employees enter the IDLH atmosphere and remain in visual or voice contact with one another at all times;

1910.134(g)(4)(ii)

At least two employees are located outside the IDLH atmosphere; and

1910.134(g)(4)(iii)

All employees engaged in interior structural firefighting use SCBAs.

Note 1 to paragraph (g): One of the two individuals located outside the IDLH atmosphere may be assigned to an additional role, such as incident commander in charge of the emergency or safety officer, so long as this individual is able to perform assistance or rescue activities without jeopardizing the safety or health of any firefighter working at the incident.

Note 2 to paragraph (g): Nothing in this section is meant to preclude firefighters from performing emergency rescue activities before an entire team has assembled.

The Respiratory Standard relating to structural firefighting is pretty straight forward, but let's take a quick review.

- ❑ Buddy system-there has to be at least two members when entering an IDLH atmosphere and all interior members have to be in visual or voice contact at all times. Meaning, that radios are not acceptable for interior crews communicating with each other. The fire service has been practicing the buddy system for over 35 years. It shouldn't take a law for your department to understand the significance of working in pairs.
- ❑ 2 OUT-There has to be at least two members outside of the IDLH atmosphere. This is where *Note 1* comes in. It clarifies who the two members outside can be. It can be the IC, Safety Officer or other member as long as it does not put the members inside the IDLH atmosphere in jeopardy by leaving their assignment. This is open for debate, because some agencies use a very liberal interpretation. (Further explanation can be found in the OSHA Q & A document).

Note: Two out does not constitute a Rapid Intervention Crew. However, a Rapid Intervention Crew does meet the requirements for two out.

- ❑ SCBA-All members inside the IDLH atmosphere shall use a SCBA. Common sense should prevail here and full PPE should be worn.

The section that has probably been most inaccurately interpreted is in Note 2 to paragraph (g). Which states,

“Note 2 to paragraph (g): Nothing in this section is meant to preclude firefighters from performing emergency rescue activities before an entire team has assembled.”

So, where is the confusion? Soon after the federal Standard was adopted, a joint letter by the IAFF and IAFC was sent to fire agencies across the Nation, which attempted to interpret the Standard. The IAFF/IAFC interpretation states the following,

Does OSHA recognize any exceptions to this regulation?

*OSHA regulations recognize deviations to regulations in an emergency operation where immediate action is necessary to save a life. For fire department employers, initial attack operations must be organized to ensure that adequate personnel are at the emergency scene prior to any interior attack at a structural fire. If initial attack personnel find a **known** lifehazard situation where immediate action could prevent the loss of life, deviation from the two-in/two-out standard may be permitted, as an exception to the fire department’s organizational plan.*

*However, such deviations from the regulations must be **exceptions** and not defacto standard practices. In fact, OSHA may still issue “de minimis” citations for such deviations from the standard, meaning that the citation will not require monetary penalties or corrective action. The exception is for a known life rescue only, not for standard search and rescue activities. When the exception becomes the practice, OSHA citations are authorized. [29 CFR 1910.134(g)(4)(Note 2)]*

When comparing the federal Respiratory Protection Standard and the interpretation by the IAFC/IAFF, there are some marked differences. Especially, in regards to making entry for rescue prior to two-out being established. So, it’s no wonder that departments developing policy based on the IAFF/IAFC document have concluded that no one should enter an IDLH atmosphere prior to establishing two out, unless there is a quote “KNOWN” rescue. However, the term “KNOWN” rescue is not found in any documents published by federal OSHA.

In fact, a clarification of the Respiratory Standard by New Mexico OSHA in response to questions by Senator Jeff Bingaman of New Mexico states “...it also does not prohibit firefighters from entering a burning structure to perform rescue operations when there is a reasonable belief that victims may be inside.” There is a big difference between “reasonable belief” and “known” rescue.

To cause further confusion, the IAFF/IAFC document uses the term “exception” in regards to Note 2, stating that when exception becomes practice, OSHA citations are authorized. Sounds serious, but this also is not supported in OSHA documentation. In the document, “Questions and Answers on The Respiratory Protection Standard” produced by OSHA in 1998, it is called an exemption. The document states the following,

Question: “Must firefighters wait until four workers are assembled before attempting to rescue victims inside the burning structure? Answer: “No. There is an explicit exemption in the respiratory protection standard that if life is in jeopardy, the two-in, two-out requirement is waived. The incident commander and the firefighters at scene must decide whether the risks posed by entering an interior structural fire prior to the assembly of at least four firefighters is outweighed by the need to rescue

victims who are at risk of death or serious harm. There is no violation of the standard under rescue circumstances.”

Read the material for yourself. There is a lot of documentation out there to wade through, but the last thing we need is enforcement agencies telling us how to take care of our own, or creating hard fast rules about saving the lives of others.

Decide for yourself, are you going In or staying Out?

Incident Description: While responding to the station for an outdoor fire call, Firefighter Cole's privately owned vehicle crossed over the centerline while negotiating a curve and struck an oncoming vehicle. Firefighter Cole was transported to the Gettysburg Hospital, but did not survive the accident. Cole was reported by authorities to have not been wearing a seat belt. The operator of the second vehicle was not injured.

Incident Description: Firefighter Reagan passed away from injuries received while working at a residential structure fire. The fire, in a detached garage, was largely extinguished and firefighters were working to put out hot spots when the garage doors and a support beam collapsed on three of them. Firefighters and law enforcement personnel at the scene worked to free the three trapped firefighters, and afterwards, they were transported to the hospital. Two of the three injured firefighters were treated for burns and released from the hospital. Two police officers also suffered minor injuries. Firefighter Reagan suffered severe injuries,

his condition worsened over the following days, and on 09/29/2007 he passed away. The fire began when the homeowner was fixing a motorcycle and fuel spilled onto a burning citronella candle.

Funeral Arrangements: Visitation on 10/04/2007, 1500-2000 hours with a memorial service to immediately follow at Aldan Union Church, 7 East Providence Road, Aldan, PA 19018. A Greene County Sheriff's Deputy was killed in a vehicle crash north of Springfield (MO) this morning. Deputy Gary D. McCormack was "running code" to an earlier car crash when he was hit by a pickup truck at an intersection. The pickup truck was being driven by Firefighter Joshua Douglas with the Ebenezer Fire Department, who was responding to the same call. Deputy McCormack, who leaves behind a wife, a 5 year old son, and a 1 year old daughter, was pronounced dead at the scene. Douglas was airlifted from the scene with serious injuries. It's the first time a Greene County deputy has been killed in the line of duty in 40 years. More to follow.

The Secret List 10-4-07 / 2344 hours

24 year old Firefighter Adam Cole of the Buchanan Valley VFD (Adams County, PA) was tragically killed in the Line of Duty last night while responding to the firehouse for a wildland fire call. Firefighter Cole's personal vehicle crossed over the centerline on a curve and struck an oncoming vehicle. Firefighter Cole was extricated and transported but did not survive the crash. FF Cole was reported as to have not been wearing his seat belt and his vehicle speed was a contributing factor. The civilian in the second vehicle was not seriously injured. The BVFC is planning a firefighter's funeral for Cole, a three-year firefighter who was recently accepted to train for the DCFD according to BVVFD sources.

Hey.... In California, 8 U.S. Forest Service Firefighters were injured when their vehicle rolled over this morning. 2 FF's suffered moderate injuries and 6 had minor injuries. The apparatus rolled 150 feet off the roadway down a steep and rocky mountainside. Several of the Firefighters were airlifted out. And in Missouri on Saturday night, a 3 car crash was caused due to fire hose laying in the middle of the highway. The hose fell off a Holts Summit fire apparatus while crews were responding to a fire. The Firefighters continued to the fire and were either unaware or unable to make it back to pick up the hose...and then the crash followed. They lost a 1200 feet of hose in the middle of the roadway. Some vehicles struck the hose, causing one of the vehicles to become disabled on the roadway. And while it was disabled on the roadway it was struck by 2 additional vehicles...and all 3 cars in the crash are total losses. Four people were transported, one with moderate and three with minor injuries.

And now....this weeks WTF ? ! AN OPEN LETTER TO THE AMERICAN FIRE SERVICE from NFFF Chairman of the Board Hal Bruno and Executive Director Ron Siarnicki: In just a couple of days, our nation will once again pay its respects to the fire Service community at the 26th Annual National Fallen Firefighters Memorial Service in Emmitsburg, Maryland. During this event, we will embrace the families of those men and women who bravely gave their lives in the line-of duty in service to their communities. The weekend events are filled with our most honored traditions as we memorialize those who have been lost, and help those who have been left behind. We have been informed that on Sunday, October 7, a religious group plans to hold a demonstration in conjunction with the service. Based on their past history, they are likely to be carrying signs and shouting slogans that are repugnant and hurtful to the families, firefighters, and others attending our solemn ceremony. Regardless, under the law, they have a right to peaceful protest and to be protected from harm.

On advice from law enforcement authorities, we have established a "demonstration area" where they will be allowed to exercise their rights without interfering in our program or other activities. We, therefore, ask all members of the fire-rescue service to stay away from the demonstration area and not become involved in any way with this group, no matter what the provocation may be. Various police agencies assisted by our own chief officers-will be on hand to control the situation and prevent any confrontation between firefighters and demonstrators.

As always, we welcome all of you to Emmitsburg to take part in the traditional ceremony that honors the memory of our fallen firefighters and provides comfort and support for their families and comrades. On that glorious morning, let us show the strength and commitment which defines an American firefighter with an epic gathering of our own. We are confident that all of you will conduct yourselves in a manner that displays the dignity, discipline and courage of who we are. Thanks to Hal and Ron's leadership on this for putting it in

perspective. We are going to the NFFF Memorial Weekend to honor Firefighters who gave their lives-and the family and friends left behind. That's it. That's the only reason.

We have been advised that a French Firefighter was killed in the Line of Duty last night (Wednesday October 10th) while operating at a store fire after becoming disoriented and running out of air. It was about 2030 hours when Bailleul Volunteer Engine Company of Nord County FD (in France) was dispatched to a store fire in the center of town. The crew forced entry and 2 members got into the store with a hand line. Reports are that Sub Officer Daniel Hosdez fell down for some reason, and when that happened, his partner, Cpl. Arnaud Lagache exited the building to request extra help. When he came back with other Firefighters, Daniel could not be located. It appears that he got up, got disorientated and was later found in the back of the store with his SCBA empty. Fire Officer Hosdez was 35 years old, 19 years veteran, father of 3 kids (5 , 3 and 1 month old). His partner, Fire Officer Lagache was burned on about 15% of his body and was transported to the hospital. As always, our sincere condolences to all effected, especially the family of Fire Officer Daniel Hosdez and the members of the Nord County FD.

A California Firefighter died in the Line of Duty today from injuries sustained while battling the Colorado Fire in Monterey County. Matthew Richard Will, a heavy fire equipment operator, was injured Monday when the bulldozer he was operating overturned and died this morning.

He was a member of the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection and was with the agency since May 2003 as a heavy equipment operator, but recently graduated from the department's fire academy. He is survived by his wife, Diana Will; son Trysten, 10; and daughter Elsie, 8. As always, our deepest condolences.

And in New Jersey, local officials announced the suspension of Dumont Fire Chief Jason Dalton yesterday as the state's Fire Safety Division investigates a training exercise that went very wrong in September.

5 Firefighters (2 in their teens) had to be hospitalized after an training exercise at residence that was later demolished. Instead of using their smoke ! machine, they used smoke bombs....and the 5 Firefighters were hurt because they were exposed to that smoke and weren't wearing SCBA's. WTF !?!

The borough is considering whether it should conduct its own investigation and expects to make that determination this week but criminal charges have not been sought.

The Dumont Firefighters don't normally conduct practice drills in borough residences and they usually don't use smoke devices but the house was to be destroyed, and the borough's smoke machine was not working...so they used smoke bombs. The instructions that accompany the devices warn users to wear respirators when using. FF's chose not to and these FF's were under supervision. Here is info on the smoke devices:

Additionally, it is unclear whether the teenagers should have been allowed participated in the exercise....but their parents and their attorneys may be able to clarify that. Having this happen is probably not the best way to verify what roles teen age FF's should and are allowed to play...a better way might be to determine that BEFORE we put them in these conditions and get them hurt. Or follow smoke bomb instructions. Or follow NFPA 1403 without exception. Just a thought. Another example of :Everything is fine until something goes wrong....NTS strikes again.

And in Ohio,2 fraternity houses and a residence hall at Bowling Green State University were evacuated yesterday after a fire truck accidentally ran into a mechanical room at the rear of Rodgers Hall and ruptured a natural gas line.

Firefighters were called to the Phi Kappa Tau house about 1330 on a report of a kitchen fire. The pumper was parked outside the building when a malfunction caused the truck to drive into the building.

The operator was on the truck in the back at the time but was not hurt. No one else was injured either. The pumper sustained significant damage.

A Lexington Fire Officer is being treated at UK Hospital after he was badly burned during a two-alarm fire in Lexington Monday night. The fire came in around 2100 hours and two teenagers were home at the time, but neither suffered injuries. The fire was in a recently built home and the Lieutenant was a member of a search team that was looking for the 2 teenagers who were possibly in the house.

Lieutenant Richard Carlin, a 12-year member of the Lexington-Fayette Division of Fire & Emergency Services, was taken to the University of Kentucky Hospital with serious burn injuries.

ALSO: We (along with 7,000 other Firefighters and Firefighter families) just returned from the 26th annual National Fallen Firefighters Foundation Memorial Weekend in Emmitsburg, MD. While the weekend was 100% focused on supporting the families of the Firefighters who were killed in the line of duty last year, we would be remiss if we didn't point out the fact that the President came to the memorial and stayed from start to end. While most any of us are at no shortage for opinions and thoughts to the President, set that aside for a moment understand that it was a significant decision and very symbolic for him to attend. He is the only President of the United States to ever attend the National Fallen Firefighters memorial service. From my very narrow world, focused on the fire service, his attendance not only meant a great deal for the fire service, but especially for the families at the memorial. He spoke personally and met with every single family that was there. We don't not all agree on the decisions he has made as our President, but for the families who lost loved ones in 2006, he did the right thing and made a difference by simply being there. He could have stayed away-but he didn't. He could have made a political speech-but it wasn't. He could have ignored one of the hottest issues in the fire service today-the embarrassing and horrific handling of Firefighter LODD heart attacks by DOJ, but he didn't. He publicly committed to fixing the Hometown Heroes fiasco. He stated "I want to tell you today that the Hometown Heroes Act will be fully implemented....this program will be administrated the way it was intended to be administrated....that's the least we can do as we honor the families of those who have died in the line of service."

We absolutely appreciate the President attending the memorial-it means great deal. And we even more look forward to the President following up with his promise. You can read his presentation word for word to those at the memorial at:

A Volunteer Firefighter in Ontario (Canada) has been charged with dangerous driving and criminal negligence causing death after he struck and killed a civilian with his car on Sept. 2. FF Justin Szucz, a 23-year-old, has been charged with dangerous driving and criminal

negligence causing death after he struck and killed Thomas Walker with his car on Sept. 2, 2007.

FF Szucz was responding to the scene of a single car crash near Walker's home. Walker was already on scene offering help to a 19-year-old hurt in the crash. As Walker's wife watched, FF Szucz's car came over a hill and hit Walker, tossing him into the air....he died shortly after that.

For two New Dundee families who live nearby each other, the past month has been a nightmare.

FF Szucz has been "cut deep" by the accident, according to his father Dave Szucz -- taking counseling and a leave of absence from firefighting. And for Linda Barton, Walker's widow, there was no joy in learning about the charges.

Today, FF Szucz and his Father will meet with a lawyer, a new and unfamiliar situation...."You wouldn't want a better kid than that in your life, and something like that happens to a kid going to help," Dave Szucz said of his child. "It's just sad for both parties."

At the Wilmot Township fire hall, the members are struggling to understand "the day you wished you'd never seen happen," Chief John Ritz said. "We've never had anything like this happen in our history. We're normally the people who are fixing problems . . . (we're not used to) getting into this kind of situation. The full reason for the fire department's existence is to help people." In his 22 months as a volunteer, Szucz had a flawless record, the chief said.

Volunteer firefighters in Ontario are not legally allowed to exceed the speed limit when responding to an emergency. While there are far more crashes involving apparatus and FD owned vehicles, here are some links worthy of checking for any kind of response situation.
